Dear Mr. Iversen,

Thank you very much for the documents provided to the Trial Chamber on 15 September 2010 pursuant to the Trial Chamber's *Invitation to the Kingdom of Denmark* (3 September 2010). I note the explanation of why the documents were produced to journalists, but not produced to the Tribunal. It appears that the Danish government read my request quite narrowly. In addition, I note that the Danish government has contented itself with simply producing the documents it had disclosed to the journalists rather than undertaking a fresh search for the documents that I requested.

In light of this less than robust response, I would like to have my Legal Advisor interview the Danish battalion commanders who were in Sarajevo in 1994 and 1995 when the two Markale marketplace explosions occurred. I understand that to be Major PS Jessen in 1994 and Major JM Wallin in 1995. My Legal Advisor Peter Robinson is prepared to come to Denmark and conduct those interviews.

By interviewing those individuals, I hope to be able to determine whether the Danish battalion forwarded reports on the Markale incidents to the government of Denmark and if so, what the nature and present location of those documents might be.

Therefore, I would appreciate it if you would authorize those interviews. Once they are completed, and it is determined that no further documents responsive to my request exist, I will be happy to withdraw my Second Motion for Binding Order.

I believe that this is a reasonable procedure given the questions surrounding the Danish government's compliance with my original request.

Thank you very much for your cooperation.
